HANDICAPPING CHANGES

There has been a change to the mens handicapping system. Now in a **Qualifying Stroke Play** competition only, scores above **Nett Double Bogey**, will be reduced, **for handicapping purposes only** to **Nett Double Bogey**. The easiest way to explain this is to think 'stableford'. Scores will be reduced to the lowest score, where you would have scored a zero in a stableford competition. eg.

For a handicap 9 player this would reduce to a 6
For a handicap 16 player this would reduce to a 7
For a handicap 28 player this would reduce to a 8
